lssue 09 July 2024 Each time I meet students, parents and families new to Sacred Heart College, one of the key messages that I wish to pass on is the importance of transition and, particularly, transition from primary school into secondary school. Academically, the evidence is overwhelming in highlighting the importance of providing a rigorous, supportive and wellinformed transition. Sacred Heart College has worked very hard in recent years to ensure that our transition processes are first class. A number of these activities are worth celebrating:

- Prospective students and families are welcomed into the College at our annual Open Evening in April. This year, we had more than 600 guests who enjoyed a range of hands-on activities across all learning areas including making key rings in Design Technology, Grass-Heads in Science, competing in a Mock Tour de France in Languages and learning percussion in Music.
- Many students from Macedon Ranges Catholic Primary Schools enjoy a full day of activities in Grade 5, as guests of the College. A special highlight on this day is making apricot balls as part of Food Technology, experimenting in Science with air propelled paper planes, which are then tested in a competition, followed by the students enjoying lunch in the College's Cafeteria.
- The College's Transition Team liaise very closely with primary schools across the Macedon Ranges to ensure that our teachers have as much information about each student as possible, in advance of their commencement in Year 7. This includes onsite visits to schools, meetings with parents and students, as well as additional transition visits to Sacred Heart College in Grade 6.

Deputy Principal – Learning and Teaching

We strive for excellence at Sacred Heart College, and we celebrate success. Success can take many forms. Success can be a statistic like our consistently high VCE results, or it can be the individual growth that we nurture in our students.

We are keen to put into practice our belief that students' abilities vary greatly and that success in learning should be celebrated in terms of personal growth and achievement.

Our Academic Awards reflect this with the mid-year awards based on the following criteria:

- Independence of learning
- Determination and perseverance and/or
- Substantial growth in learning

At the end of Semester Two we celebrate those who achieved the highest results in their subjects.

To allow our students to experience success, they must be literate. The reading program for all students in Year 7, combined with an intensive literacy program for a number of Year 7 and Year 8 students, maximise the opportunities for learning.

Our Learning Enhancement Program (LEP) is in place for our highly able students in Years 7 – 9. Students in the LEP are provided with work that should challenge and engage them – perhaps leading to acceleration into subjects at a higher year level standard from Year 9 onwards.

The diversity of subjects available for students to select at Sacred Heart allows students to follow their preferred pathways. This ranges from a choice of languages (Japanese or French) as well as life skills in financial literacy and food studies. The range of hands-on applied learning subjects such as VET Automotive studies and VET Construction Pathways allow those with a trades pathway in mind to pursue their interests while at Sacred Heart.

Opportunities for enriched learning occur through events such as the partnerships with schools in France and Japan, participation in the Debaters Association of Victoria competition, a wide range of excursions, and Learning Area Weeks that have a range of activities to promote the subjects that we offer.

Learning is a rich experience for the students of Sacred Heart College.



Fostering a Love of Reading in Year 7

This year a new reading

initiative has commenced in Year 7 with the aim of supporting consistent reading habits and strengthen literacy skills – building a strong foundation for future learning. It is designed to compliment the fortnightly library sessions that take place during English classes.

The 'Hillary Collection' offers a treasure trove of books, readily available during English lessons and Wednesday Homerooms.

During the transition program at the start of the year, the students completed an activity on stories that they loved. These have been compiled into a word cloud that hangs above the collection.

It is wonderful to see the students coming into Wednesday Homeroom, choosing a book, and commencing the day with quiet reading.



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Food Technology – Ms Belinda Kime

Year 7 and 8 Food Technology explores a variety of basic cooking techniques. Towards the end of Term 1 the students practiced their baking skills and focused on the rubbing in method. They had an opportunity during practical lessons to practice the skill by making scones, then mastering it by making Easter themed biscuits. Working in pairs, students made their basic biscuit dough, then shaped it using Easter themed cookie cutters, such as rabbits, eggs, flowers and butterflies. After they



baked their biscuits, students decorated them using icing pens, lollies and chocolates.

The Year 9 Food Technology classes in Term 1 studied the Australian Guide to Healthy Eating and looked at nutritious meals that represented the food guide. Their assessment task was a design brief where they investigated poke bowls (sometimes referred to as Buddha bowls, nourishing bowls or salad bowls). Students had an opportunity to independently cook a poke bowl of their choice. Their poke bowls were well presented, colourful and incorporated the five food groups displayed in the Australian Guide to Healthy Eating. They all looked super tasty too!





Robotics

This semester our talented Year 7 and 8 Robotics students embarked on an exciting journey of engineering and innovation. Students have been diligently working to build and program their Lego Mindstorm robots to move in the form of shapes. Many of these robots successfully used sensors, such as the colour sensor and distance recognition to avoid any obstacles. Through this hands-on experience, students have gained invaluable skills in problem-solving, teamwork and critical thinking. In our final lesson, students transformed their robots into formidable contenders for a Battle Bot Competition where the most robust and well-built robot could win against any competitor!

Deputy Principal – Student Wellbeing

At Sacred Heart College, we pride ourselves on our approach to nurturing the wellbeing of our community - students, parents and staff. The integral link between wellbeing and learning cannot be understated. Learn. Care. Flourish are founding concepts upon which an education at Sacred Heart College rests. They represent the relationship between learning and wellbeing that, when optimised, allow young people to thrive and flourish.

This year the Wellbeing Team have focussed on developing the power of student voice. To that end, we have redesigned a Student Representative Council with students drawn from each year level and Homeroom. These students come together once a term in a forum with their respective Junior or Senior College Captains, to raise issues or pitch ideas for improvement. These students were also invited to take part in the Macedon Ranges Shire Council's Youth Summit where they were able to tackle youth issues for the region and bring the power of their voice into the local community. Diversity and inclusion is another space where we are promoting student voice and participation. In conjunction with Sunbury COBAW Community Health, the College offers a fortnightly student group, known as D@SH, as both a space for connection and sharing but also with the goal of raising awareness and advocating for change.

Our Parent Engagement Program aims at ensuring that parents, along with local community members have access to renowned speakers on a range of topics from Cyber Safety to Inclusion and Diversity, and Parenting. The College believes in the importance and the power of an effective three way partnership – student/teacher/parent. Our Parent Engagement Program provides best practice Professional Learning through quality guest speakers on current educational topics and issues. So far in 2024 we have hosted Susan McLean, a Cyber Safety expert, who also presented to our students, on the challenges young people face in navigating online spaces. Michell Mitchell provided an engaging presentation and discussion to our community around parenting teenages. Later in the year, we will host Bree Gorman, who will speak to parents and staff on diversity, equity and inclusion, and Maria O'Shannessy who will run a parent coaching workshop.
