Parent Engagement Evening

This week at Sacred Heart College, we were privileged to have renowned presenter, pod-caster and author, Dr Jodi Richardson, present an engaging evening on the topic 'Anxiety and Teens'. Jodi is an expert on the topic of anxiety, having studied it extensively as well as experiencing the debilitating condition first hand, and was able to offer practical tips and activities for managing anxiety, as well as the medical causes of why it occurs. Her focus on encouraging children to push through, using the mantra ' it might be hard, but it's important', and that resilience only comes from trying hard things and being successful, gave confidence to those struggling with young people who suffer from anxiety and worry about how far to push them. It is a difficult condition, and a growing problem in schools and in society at large, so hearing advice from an expert of such caliber was very worthwhile.



Changes to payment method in Canteen (Atrium)

The College has streamlined it's payment method for purchasing food from the canteen. Students will no longer be able to use their Credit or Debit Cards in the canteen if they are stored on their phone. As phone use is not allowed at school, this process has become untenable. Students now can purchase food using their Student Card, cash and physical Credit and Debit cards. Money can be loaded onto their student cards via the My Schools link that all parents have been sent. 

Tomorrow Man/Tomorrow Woman


Last week our Year 11s took part in their annual Tomorrow Man/Tomorrow Woman workshops. These workshops are held each year throughout the Senior School, with Year 10-12 students participating in a 3-module program over their senior years. The Tomorrow Man/Tomorrow Woman program offers students opportunities to pause and listen deeply to each others' stories. The workshop presenters generate conversation spaces where students can contemplate what it means to be a young adult, and they provide prompts for students to reflect on the challenges that hold us back, and the resources that help to push us forward. All of our Year 11s are to be commended for their open and sincere participation in the workshops, where many students spoke with open hearts and all listened with a spirit of empathy and compassion.

The following reflection from a male Year 11 student offers an insight into the power of these sessions: "The setting was very welcoming and wholesome. All of the boys that took part in the Tomorrow Man workshop were very inclusive and not judgemental at all. It was a great way to break down walls around your peers and get to know the rest of my cohort on a different level than what I am used to. When I left the workshop a lot of my outlooks changed on the way I approach certain situations and express myself in any setting. It also taught me that I can be vulnerable and let emotional honesty become more of a normal occurrence in my life. All round, Tomorrow Man was a very good experience and I learned a lot from it."

Year 11 Religious Education – Study of Modern Slavery This term, students of Year 11 Religious Education have been extending their knowledge of modern slavery.


Recently they have been studying the supply chain of familiar products that we use in everyday life. Below are two pieces of work created to demonstrate the process of cocoa/chocolate and the impact this chain of supply has on the people who create and grow the cocoa.



CHOCOLATE WE LOVE THE TRUTH YOU DON'T KNOW



From a whole bar of Chocolate a Cocoa farmer will only earn **6%** from that sale



Chocolals farmers only ever get 0% from a bar of chocolate whereas from a bar: 35% go to the shops actually selling the chocolate bar - 33% go to the Manufactures that arcete the chocolate from the accoa bar - 12% go toward the police that protect the chocolate from being stolen - 7% to the broker who makes the overseas trades - 7% to the processors.



GET CIVEN TO OTHERS Most maney go to others that have made trades for a while or work/live in places with stricter laber leves surrounding their practice's leading to scam the farmers out of mate so they can be within the law and still make a

Time management and study in Year 12 VCE

Now that we have reached Term 3, it seems timely to remind students of the importance of practising good time management skills and strategies whilst at home and/or at school.

Time management is key to getting the most out of students' final year of secondary schooling. We want our students to achieve their best results, whilst staying healthy and happy. Students need to try and maintain a balance of school work, recreation, time with family and friends, and most importantly enough sleep. The following is some advice that was provided to our Year 12 students early in Term 1:

- Aim for completing 3 hours of additional revision/study time per subject per week
 ◊ Break this up into 30-45-minute blocks (don't try to study for 3 hours on one topic/subject)
 ◊ Remember your study periods at school can be included in this so don't waste them
- Complete a **weekly study timetable** and include time for eating, sleeping, recreation and part-time work, as well as your time for study
 - ◊ Consider the best times for you to do your study, e.g. Are you a morning or an evening person?
 - This is time to complete homework, but also to revise what you have learned during the day, make summaries and/or quizlets, and attempt practice questions
 - Ouse your study timetable and/or to-do lists to tick off tasks as you complete them, this will give you a good sense of achievement

MEDICATION AND CAMPS

To ensure safe administration and storage of medications, any student requiring medication while

on camp must hand their medication to their homeroom teacher the first morning of camp. <u>All</u> medication needs to be clearly labelled with the student's name and in its original packaging. <u>All</u> medication needs to be accompanied by a completed Medical Authority Form. INFLUENZA (Flu)

We have a confirmed case of Influenza A (flu) within the College. The flu is a contagious viral infection that can cause severe illness and life-threatening complications, including pneumonia. The flu is spread by contact with fluids from coughs and sneezes.

The common symptoms of the flu are fever, a dry cough, body aches, feeling extremely weak and tired, sore throat and a runny or stuffy nose. As the flu is highly contagious and since there have been several cases reported in our local community, the College is taking every precaution to prevent further spread of the infection. If your child is unwell and or showing flu like symptoms, please don't send them to school. If your child is displaying flu like symptoms while at school, they will be isolated and parents/emergency contacts will be called to collect them. The Public Health and Wellbeing Regulations state that students are to be excluded from school until they are well. Assistance Dog at SHC

In other Junior School news, we have a student who has commenced at the College with an Assistance dog. All students across the College have been briefed on how to treat Assistance dogs. Below is some information regarding the treatment of Assistance dogs. We would encourage you to have some conversations with your young people on the proper treatment of Assistance dogs in schools.

If your child's asthma and/or allergies are triggered by dog hair, and you have any concerns, please don't hesitate to contact Jalna Holmes, Health Centre Coordinator at the College, on 54211 200.



WHAT TO DO WHEN AN ASSISTANCE DOG IS PRESENT?

- Always show the dog and their owner respect by providing space and giving them the right of way.
- Don't touch, feed, talk to, or otherwise distract the dog and don't be offended if the owner asks you not to pet the dog. The dog should be allowed to concentrate and perform its work for the safety of its handler.
- Recognise that the dog has a right to be present everywhere on school, even where you would not expect to see a dog, such as in a lift, canteen.
- If you are unfamiliar with dogs, be assured that an Assistance Dog presents no threat to you, or other students. They are highly trained, working dogs.
- Assistance Dogs are highly respected in the Australia.

SHOWING AN ASSISTANCE DOG PROPER RESPECT

- Failing to respect an Assistance Dog would be considered to be a serious issue that will be immediately followed up and dealt with.
- Confronting an Assistance Dog's owner about the presence of their dog or making derogatory comments about the dog could be considered harassment/bullying.
- Not following the rules and regulations, including harassment of an Assistance Dog or their owner could lead to the taking action and consequences to follow..

Year 8 History Incursion – Medieval Europe

Students who are planning on applying for further education need to complete an application through VTAC. VTAC is the admissions centre for applications. Applications open on Monday 31 July 2023.

To assist students and parents in the application process the Careers Department has provided recorded links from VTAC on the University/TAFE application process. These webinar presentations will demonstrate the steps involved in applying for University and TAFE places, including SEAS (Special Entry Access Scheme) and Scholarship information.

The Careers Department delivered a VTAC presentation to our Year 12 students on Tuesday 1 August, and follow up sessions to support their application will be offered throughout the remainder of the year. We strongly advise that you watch the presentations and webinars to support your young person at this critical time.

Lauretta is a past student (Class of 2012) and is currently competing in this prestigious event in France. It's a proud milestone for the

28-year-old from Fern Hill who the Macedon Ranges has been cheering on throughout her professional road cyclist career.

"I've always watched the Tour de France, but it was only last year that a women's edition was added to the race and I was allowed to dream of racing it for myself," she said.

"It's a pretty special moment and I'm excited to be a part of one of the most iconic races in the world."

Lauretta was one of two Aussie members of the seven strong Lidl-Trek team. They faced eight stages with a start at Clermont Ferrand on July 23, and finished with a Time Trial in Pau in the south of France on Sunday.

Lauretta was injured when she took a metre-long slide in the wet during the second stage but brushed off the incident as minor.

"I'm okay, I'm fine, it's just a bit of road rash but it could have been much worse!" she said.

"The toughest stage is probably going to be stage seven where we finish at the top of Col du Tourmalet. It's an iconic climb in cycling and one of the highest paved mountains in the French Pyrenees."





On her social media, the rider confirmed this prediction, "Thank you Col du Tourmalet. I was broken, battling through fatigue and a tummy bug, but the fans kept me going and gave us all a day to remember".




