
### **Student and Staff Activities**



# MERCY DAY

Next Friday 8 September is Mercy Day. This is only one week away! If your child is going to participate in the Colour Run, make sure you give permission through PAM!

Mercy Day is a fun day for students and staff, when we celebrate being a Mercy school as a College Community. All Year Levels have organised activities/competitions for fun and to fundraise. This will be the first Mercy Day we have been able to run for four years, so it is very special.



Our day begins with an Assembly featuring Sr Cathy Solano, talking about the great work the charity arm Mercy Work does. This is what all of our fundraising on the day goes towards.

Mercy Day is mostly cashless, with many activities and competitions costing one coupon. These cost \$2 each and are pre-purchased. This money needs to be returned in the envelope supplied to students by 1 September. This is also the case for the \$5 entry to the Colour Run.



### **McAuley Sleepout 2023**


As part of our Year 9 Reflection Day this year, we will be launching a new social outreach initiative. In the lead up to this day, Year 9 students have been invited to consider taking part in our inaugural "McAuley Sleepout". The McAuley Sleepout will take place as an act of solidarity with those experiencing homelessness and housing insecurity, and will serve as a fundraising activity for McAuley Community Services for Women and Children.

Sleeping arrangements for the sleepout will be on camping mats in Quambi, and those participating will spend time throughout the evening contemplating issues of social justice and concern. We are also planning to have participants spend time together in shared meal preparation and table fellowship as part of the experience.

As this is the inaugural year of the McAuley Sleepout, we will be placing a cap of 40 people on the number of participants. Year 9 students are welcome to apply to participate in this event, via the details shared with them. A key part of their application is to seek the support of their family, and so Year 9 families may like to be in conversation about this opportunity. All participants will be invited to seek sponsorship for taking part in the sleepout, with all money raised being donated to McAuley Services, one of our Mercy Ministry Companions.

### Listen, Learn, Love: Social Justice Statement 2023

The recent celebration of Social Justice Sunday also saw the launch of the ACBC's annual Social Justice Statement. This year's statement is titled 'Listen, Learn, Love', and calls us into compassionate encounter with Australia's First Peoples. While the statement examines the many concerns that arise from past and current injustices endured by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples, it is a document imbued with hope and a desire for healing. The closing message of the statement echoes the calling that we proclaim as we live and learn together each day at Sacred Heart: "Let us commit ourselves to fostering a civilisation of love in Australia. Let's come together in friendship and love to show all that love can not only change individual lives, but that it can change society for the better. Throughout the course of the referendum campaign, let us bear in our hearts the words of Paul: Let all that you do be done in love (1 Corinthians 16:14)".

# Practice Exams – Unit 3 /4

Practice examinations will be conducted during the second week of the next school holidays (Monday 25 September - Thursday 28 September) to give students the best opportunity to succeed in their final examinations at the end of the year.

In 2023, after previous years' disruptions, these will be particularly important to provide examination experience in preparation for the VCAA External Examinations, as well as some additional handwriting practice for our students.

All students studying English will complete their practice examination on Monday 25 September (session one) and students doing Music Repertoire Performance will complete their practice examination in session two. Students are then given the opportunity to select their preferred times for completion of their practice examinations over the following three days. Students who are not studying English may select one of their other subjects to complete at this time.

Where possible, students should try to arrange the timing of practice examinations as per the VCAA examination timetable. For example, Psychology and Biology are both morning examinations, so it would be ideal to select morning examination sessions, whereas Business Management and Legal Studies are afternoon examinations, so select afternoon practice sessions accordingly.

Students have been provided with a link to nominate the times preferred, to allow us to manage the administration of individual examinations. This needs to be completed by **Friday 1 September.** 

Examinations will be held in the Multi-Purpose Room. The supervisors are external supervisors employed by the College, and they will be the same supervisors we will have at the end of the year.

### Important points to remember:

- Students must complete one examination for each of their subjects.
- Year 10 or 11 students studying a Unit 3/4 must complete a trial examination in their chosen study.
- Students are to arrive at least 15 minutes prior to the commencement of each exam.
- While wearing the school uniform is compulsory for the final exams, the expectation for the practice examinations is neat and tidy casual attire.
- Students may leave the examination centre once their examination time is completed.
- The Dwyer Senior Learning Centre will be available between morning and afternoon examinations.
- Students will need to make their own transport arrangements to and from the College, and should enter and park via Gate 5.






# **Student Reflections**

# Concrete actions to protect our common home

The Mount Alexander bioregion spans uplands, goldfields and volcanic and riverine plains, however, much of the natural environment bears scars from past human activities. In August, Sacred Heart College Kyneton took action to help support the biodiversity in this bioregion. Twenty students and two staff worked alongside Cassina Environmental Services to revegetate a swampy area in the foothills of Barfold.

In challenging terrain and weather, approximately 400 indigenous species were planted. Returning local native species to this region will provide essential food for insects and other small creatures, and in turn support many local birds and other












