

In her presentation, Sr Cathy shared stories about her life, and offered some of the wisdom that she has gained from her time spent in Mercy communities around the world. Woven throughout her address was an ongoing invitation to see our world through the eyes of Mercy, and to serve as living instruments of Mercy in our communities. There have been some great conversations that have arisen amongst staff and students in response to Sr Cathy's wisdom, and we thank her for the generosity of her time and her spirit of Mercy companionship.



We all left the Conference well informed and moved to action, promising to retell our experience to others the College.







Unit 2 Applied Computing

On Thursday 7 September our Unit 2 Applied Computing class had David Shaw, a Network Security Specialist, as guest speaker. David has 50 years of experience in the IT industry, working for a variety of government organisations and businesses, and spoke about the many changes he has seen in technology over that time. David completed a tertiary qualifications in electronics and was recruited shortly after to work in the IT industry. When he first started his career in 1974, computers were the size of two large classrooms and had 1% of the processing power that we now have in most mobile phones!

Network Security, Cyber Security and Network Architecture are all synonymous for the same thing – how to keep networks and the sensitive information that belongs to that business/organisation network secure. David spoke about how a cyber attack will occur for most businesses and organisations at some point, it's all about having a

good disaster recovery plan to be able to recover any lost or stolen information. Skills in the IT/Network industry are becoming increasingly important to have, as cyber attacks are becoming more prevalent. David is supposed to be in retirement but is constantly being called upon for his expertise. We thank David for spending time with our VCE Applied Computing students, who gained valuable insight into what a Cyber Security career could look like for them.

Jirrahlinga Dingo Conservation and Wildlife Education Centre

On Wednesday September 6, the Year 1 VET Certificate II in Animal Care students headed out to visit the Jirrahlinga Dingo Conservation and Wildlife Education Centre located in Chewton. Their vision is to be a World Class Wildlife Sanctuary, delivering high standards of care, compassion and ethics to their animals, as they work towards the long-term sustainability of all wildlife and the environment.

Students were able to meet and interact with some of Australia's amazing wildlife, including koalas, wombats, dingoes, snakes, lizards, and a variety of native birds. We were educated about the history and conservation status of these native species,

and what we can do to help to preserve them and Australia's biodiversity.

We will take this knowledge back to school with us as we study our next unit, aimed at providing basic care of common native mammals.









NATIONAL THREATENED SPECIES DAY - Marika Payne

On 7 September each year, many people stop and reflect on the fact that on that same date in 1936, Australia's Tasmanian tiger, also known as the thylacine (Thylacinus cynocephalus), slipped over the extinction line. Sixty years later in 1996, the Threatened Species Network founded by WWF-Australia and the Australian Government's Natural Heritage Trust, established National Threatened Species Day to commemorate the death of the last Tasmanian tiger at Hobart Zoo.

National Threatened Species Day is a day when we shine a spotlight on all the Australian native animal and plant species that are facing similar fates to that of the Tasmanian tiger.

Sacred Heart College celebrated our iconic Aussie wildlife with the help of Chris and Taasha Humfrey and the animals from the 'Zoo Comes to You'. The focus of our learning was understanding the threats our local and regional species face, and the actions each one of us can take to help conserve these species for future generations.


