



ACTING PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE - Debra McNaughton

NAPLAN

Students in Years 7 and 9 have completed their NAPLAN tests this week. As always, the NAPLAN results are just one of the many forms of data that teachers consider to ensure that we are meeting the needs of all of our students. There are some changes this year, however. The first is that NAPLAN has not been conducted in March before. This is two months earlier than usual, and it will remain in Term One for the foreseeable future.

The second change is more significant. No longer will there be 10 levels of achievement against which the students' performance is measured.

The numerical NAPLAN bands and the national minimum standard, will be replaced by the following 4 levels of achievement:

- Exceeding
- Strong
- Developing
- Needs additional support.

The descriptors for each category will make it clear to parents what their child's literacy and numeracy skills are at the time of NAPLAN testing, and support discussions with their school on their child's progress.' https://www.acara.edu.au/docs/default-source/media-releases/naplan-proficiency-standards-media-release-2023-02-10.pdf

At Sacred Heart, we are hoping that the new method of reporting makes the NAPLAN results even more useful and easier to navigate. Parents can expect to receive the NAPLAN results in July.

D@SH - Diversity at Sacred Heart

Next term will mark the 12-month anniversary of the formation of our D@SH group. D@SH stands for Diversity at Sacred Heart and is another group/option for students at the College to connect to others in a safe, respectful and inclusive way under the guidance of COBAW Health.

During the year this group has evolved to be a place where like-minded young folk meet up to just enjoy a supportive, non-judgemental space where they can be themselves. What we see as the real value of D@SH is simply in building both connections and personal confidence.

The importance of diversity amongst our student body should not be underestimated. Diversity includes all areas of our College, whether that be ability, culture or gender. It is well documented that students feel safer in school and in life when they are educated in a diverse setting. It is hugely beneficial for students to be able to learn about different cultures and backgrounds, the identity journey some have, the strengths and the weaknesses we all have, and the importance acceptance and understanding plays in providing a positive school experience for all.

Familiarity and understanding leads to a greater sense of acceptance, which in turn makes students more comfortable with themselves. We have various forms of support for our diverse students, whether that be through Learning Support, the Chill Room, Learning HQ and now D@SH. It is worth noting that broader studies of diverse communities, show higher rates of mental illness, self harm, and suicidality that often correlate with experiences of exclusion and discrimination. The best way to combat this is to ensure that all diverse students have an environment that supports them. That is what we are aiming to do.

MOBILE PHONES

The end of term one is the time to remind Parents/ Guardians/ Carers of the College expectations for students and mobile phone use. We have not introduced a total ban on students bringing phones to school, as being a regional College with students travelling often great distances, there may be times where communication with parents is vital. Sometimes a bus may break down, or a parent with shared parental arrangements may not realise they have to pick their child up. We understand that these are times when phones are necessary. However, there is no time during the school day at school that



using a mobile phone is acceptable. Our Cyberhound security system protects our school computers, but not so mobile phones. This means that students can access anything on the internet through their mobile network. They are also the major tool in current times bullying.

It is preferable to us that students do not bring their mobile phones to school.

Our policy states:

'Mobile phones are to remain switched off and in student lockers during the school day. Parent contact needs to be made through general reception or the relevant student offices.'

I would like to stress that 'contact needs to be made through general reception or the relevant student offices'. Students have had their phones confiscated because parents have rung during class time, and this is becoming quite problematic for the College. They have carried the phone on their person because parents have requested them to do so, in order to be contacted. Please do not do this. The process is to contact either Student Office and they will pass the message to the student. This way the sign out process will be waiting.

As a part of our duty of care, we need to know at all times where students are, and also if they are unwell at school. When students who are feeling unwell ring parents directly, the College is often not aware. This needs to be logged by First Aid, and if necessary a parent called. This way we can track First Aid use or overuse, and then we investigate other reasons for not attending class. If the student has a stomach bug, it may be gastroenteritis or flu, which alerts us to the possibility of more students becoming unwell. Students are required to be signed out if they leave the College throughout the day, so organising to leave with a parent without doing so contravenes our legal obligation. Please contact me if further clarification is required.

Dr Michael Carr-Gregg - Parent Engagement Evening

On Tuesday 15 March, the College presented its first Parent Engagement Program event for 2023. The audience of over 200 people was privileged to hear a presentation by esteemed Psychologist, Dr Michael Carr-Gregg. Dr Carr-Gregg spoke on the topic of 'Boy's Issues', and pointed out the strengths as well as the challenges young men are facing today. He was both insightful and entertaining, sharing his wealth of knowledge with the very engaged audience. Some interesting facts were:

- Adolescence is now considered to range from 10-24 years of age
- Young people now know at 11 what they used to know at 16 years of age
- Who they hang out with is the real indicator of outcomes
- Risk taking behavior is common as frontal lobe / consequences of action part of the brain have not yet developed- Ferrari
 Brain with Bicycle Brakes!
- 1 in 7 primary school boys and 1 in 5 secondary school boys have mild to moderate anxiety
- Accountability and consequences are important
- Important for parents to model support for authority
- Important for families to develop their own traditions/ rites of passage

SENIOR SCHOOL NEWS - Paul Matthews, Head of Senior School

Moving into the last two weeks of Term 1, there is plenty happening in the Senior School before we finish up for Easter. Year 12 have taken a break from their studies and are away on Retreat. This is a significant part of the Year 12 calendar, where students and staff involved, have time to stop, reflect and strengthen relationships.

Year 11 continue to work on their dance steps for the Debutante Ball, which will be held on 1 April. While Year 10 have their Morrisby Psychometric Profiling on Thursday 30 March. The information collected during the Morrisby profiling will be used to support Year 10 students with decisions relating to their pathways and subjects as they progress through the Senior School.

The release of the Interim report for Term 1, completed assessment tasks and Student Progess Interviews, allows families and students to reflect on learning behaviours and achievement this term. The information within these reports can affirm learning behaviours or offer strategies to make adjustments as we move into Term 2 and the Semester One Exams. Smith Family: student2student reading program Each year, Year 11 students have an opportunity to live their Mercy Value of Service by participating in the Smith Family student2student reading program. The program makes a significant difference to the readers. Last year Victorian s2s Readers improved their reading age on average by 1 year and 2 months, and overall. Unapproved Bus Travellers

Sacred Heart College students travel to and from school on both private and Government buses. The students who travel on the buses have been approved



by the co-ordinating school, Kyneton High School. It is the responsibility of the School Bus Coordinator at KHS to approve travellers and allocate students to the bus services. Students cannot get approval to travel on a different bus to their usual one from the bus driver.

CSEF Applications (Camps, Sports & Excursions Fund) - Closing Date 23/06/2023


